Races, races, races! Read all about it in THE FINISH LINE! Well, "all" may be a bit strong, but you get the who finished and who placed. "Cornstalk" started off the month at the Loda 10K with a WIN! You'll have to ask Pat or Donna for an instant replay of this great moment in Koerner racing history as I wasn't there. My running has been less than great since mid-March and the prospect of a hilly, hot 10K was not appealing. I opted for the Racing Hearts 10K in Joliet the next day. It is FLAT and FAST. Unfortunately, Lance Boyard was the only member of our club to place, a none too shabby second overall.

Lance was just tuning up for The 5 Miler which he won. It was warm, as always, but starting at 8 A.M. for the first time in its twelve years running helped considerably. Pat Baldwin's first outing as race director went well, but he did get a remedial lesson in the attention span of runners at the starting line. About 20 seconds into his turn by

turn description of the entire course, the runners tuned him out for the next two minutes. When Pat concluded by asking if there were any questions, Joe Page asked: "Would you please repeat that?" Other thoughts for next year: Mow the transition area from KCC to Shapiro and add a second water station. The post-race refreshments were excellent - Coke, Domino's Pizza, and a treat from the DQ. And, of course, the Tuesday before The 5 Miler was the first of the Performance Sports 5K Series. Something over 40 runners enjoyed a beautiful evening's run and refreshments before adjourning to Chicago Dough for some serious refreshments and the celebration of Linda Linn's 38th (naw, must have been 28th!) year young.

On June 18th we - Linns, Hickeys, Goodberlets - were off to play in Peoria. If you check your calendar, you will find the 18th was a Thursday and you know the Steamboat 4M & 15K wasn't until Saturday (7 A.M.!). Well, we kind of like to get rested up for this race with a couple days around the pool of the host hotel, a walk up to Runner's Central, a walk down to the Steamboat Days festivities on the riverfront, and we check out a couple restaurants. This is also a Hickey reunion. Ma and Pa come up from Port Charlotte and sister Debbie, son T.J., and husband Tom come up from Decatur. Debbie is the only nonrunner. Here a Hickey, there a Hickey, a Hickey everywhere but on my neck. Probably would have been one there if the gang had let me help the poor young lady we saw standing against a building wearing the shortest and tightest bluejean shorts and equally skimpy top. I mean, these were obviously hand-me-downs from a larger sister. Instead, Karl Goodberlet was kind enough to let me have Littlefoot to sleep with the night before the race. Thanks, Karl!

Race day was perfect for racing. Overcast, temperature in the 50s, and with just a breeze at 7 A.M. The Grotevants, Malones, and Larry Lane were there. The world record for four miles for both men (17:34) and women (20:10) was set on this course. For

mere mortals, the trick is getting a position where the crown doesn't slow you down (about 3,000 participants). A number of us got good position this day and Erma Hickey (Ma Hickey) and Shirley Malone placed in their age group. Graig Hickey, who is really starting to come of age (Translation: He dusted me off!) ran a PR. Charlie ran his fastest Steamboat 15K and was 4th our of 41 in his age group - but they only went three deep. Charlie and Larry were the real men in challenging a 15K course that is as tough as the 4 mile is fast. This is the only race I can remember running each mile faster that the preceding mile.

No, I don't know who won Steamboat. As good as the weather was for racing, it was windy and chilly for the outdoor post-race festivities. Our group was short on cool weather clothing. I am aware of one age group world record because immediately upon exiting the finish chute I encountered Warren Utes of Park Forest. Warren was last year's Runner's World Master of the Year. He ran 23:50 for four miles -about 5:57 per mile. His is 71 or 72 years young!

Real women also go 15K! Carol Pratt-Bauer ran 66:19 and placed 5th in her age group, but her only reward was the satisfaction of having run a great time and being seeded as an elite runner - #93! Well, not quite the only satisfaction. I presume she was permitted to touch the plaque her mother won!

Back in Kankakee County, the day after Steamboat was the Father's Day Manteno 5K and the unseasonably cool weather made running ideal. 154 runners crossed the finish line and about half were either Hickeys or Kilbrides. Yes, folks, this is the "8 K's Racing Team" annual outing. Gerry, Judy, their children, and children's spouses or friends appear to make up half the field and carry home their share of the gold. Gerry says that half the fun is talking about it for three months leading up to the race.

Team Hickey, minus the Decatur contingent, almost spent the day at the Manteno H.S. It seems daughter Krista caught a ride to the post-race breakfast buffet in downtown Manteno and the car keys with her. Mike, Georganne, Graig and Ma and Pa Hickey had to

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hitch a ride in the bed of Henry Shelly's pickup. I hadn't really thought of Krista as a blond, but it probably comes from her Aunt Debbie. Debbie arrived in Peoria ahead of husband Tom on Friday and left the car keys and instructions on how to get to the restaurant we had chosen for dinner. She did not, however, include the location of the car with that information.

The race? Well, you had to be age 41 to win - Gary Moss in 16:25 and Que Harbor in 18:42. Graig Hickey dusted me off for the second time in one weekend in winning his age group. Pat Koerner was the second male overall and Theresa Burgard the second female overall. As in past years, Sue LaMore did just about as perfect a job of race directing as can be done. This was the first year of the computerized by Dave Bohlke. Did you notice the 1,000 foot extension cord run from the high school to Dave's computer?

To wrap up the month's racing in the county, Pat Koerner ordered up some more of that unseasonably cool weather left over from the Steamboat-Manteno weekend and brought in some speed merchants for the YMCA 5K. Lance Boyard continued to strut his stuff with a sizzling 16:09 - for 4th place! Pete Mathis Jr. set a course record in 15:47. Julie Anderson took the women's title in 18:45. I was embarrassed, but not by Graig Hickey who gave me a break this day. No, I did it myself by telling everybody I had counted four ahead of me in age group when, in fact, there was one who I only assumed was ahead of me (a lawyer should know better!). I picked up my gold and admitted I couldn't count to four!

While the media usually treats us like

Rodney Dangerfield, we did get some good coverage- two pics, a story, and race stats in Sunday's edition. Now if we can just educate them on the concept of the varying depth of awards in age group, maybe everyone who got an award will be listed. Be patient. They really are trying to grasp our insanity - except Shoup. I told Jeff Bonty that the holes in Shoup's hat matched ones in his head - you just have to look really close. He came, he saw, he believes!

Dale Huizenga is back - was back. For the first time in about three years, Dale joined us for a race. His absence has meant that Charlie Grotevant and I picked up some gold that we wouldn't have, had Dale been there. Hope to see you again soon, Dale!

Congratulations to our triathletes - Kathy Steffen, Jim Grace, and Julie Anderson - who found a number of events this month and met with some success. I don't know about finishing position, but Jim just get the endurance award for finishing three events.

There was so much going on this month and, although I've written a ton, I feel I've missed something. We continue to solicit your contributions, whether as a participant, spectator, or member of a support crew (see Anna Goodberlet's piece on Lake County). LAKE COUNTY HALF MARATHON

(from the perspective of a non-runner)

I could write about the course and the feeling of accomplishment from running the half-marathon April 26, 1992 at Lake County, but I didn't run or walk, so I can't. You will now get the perspective from a bystander.

Tom and I left tow around 12:30 P.M. (after a Little League game). The Sheraton in Northbrook was very easy to find, even for country bumpkins that do not travel much. We were wondering if we would have a hard

time finding our running cohorts, but first things first, we had to check in and get Tom's running packet. It was very convenient that the Sheraton was the race headquarters and after picking up his packet we headed back to the lobby. Our thoughts turned to "what next" (my priority was to get to Northbrook Court Mall) when we found everybody. Dee & Ozzie, Mike & Margie Morel and Nancy & Ron were there, we even had a short conversation with Shirley Malone before she headed off with the group she had come with. (We were never to see Shirley again, but we thought of her often.) Our rooms weren't ready yet, so we had time on our hands. (Yes, yes, the mail!) The Ozenglewskis and Morels, who had arrived a good deal earlier, had already been to the mall. I begged and whined until Tom finally gave in and we went shopping. I could tell you how wonderful our shopping trip was, but it wasn't. We were in and out of that mall so fast it made my head swim. Next year (if we go) I'm either skipping Kyle's ballgame or supper. (Shopping requires a certain amount of time, you know.) We still managed to buy a few things, though. Nancy & Ron picked a wonderful family owned Italian restaurant for supper (I can't remember the name but I think it was Tonnelli's). It was a thoroughly enjoyable and delicious meal for the entire group. Soon afterwards, we parted company with the agreement that I would pick up the halfmarathoners at the finish line. With Nancy & Ron joining us, we took a test drive so I wouldn't get lost the next morning. We won't go into the rest of the night's activities. Let's just say it all started when Tom and I didn't agree on which move to watch on Spectravision, then he fell asleep in about 10 minutes not caring that I was a nervous wreck about being at the finish line of my first half-marathon.

The runners were off by 5:40 A.M. to catch the shuttle to the starting line. I was up and on the road by 8:30 A.M., heading north to pick them up at the finish line. I was told it was perfect day to run 13 miles, cool & very little wind, but I was chilled to the bone standing there waiting for them. Seriously, as long as I don't have to work the finish, I really love

going to the races (and no John, it's not to look at the men). It was very exciting as the fastest runners started coming across the finish line looking as though they had run a 5K, not a half-marathon. One hour and 40 minutes had elapsed when I saw a woman approaching the finish who look like Nancy, but I wasn't expecting her this soon (sorry Nancy), but as she got closed I knew it was her. I yelled my head off in support, but she didn't acknowledge me. Pretty soon Mike came in, again I yelled. Mike gave me a wave which made the whole trip worthwhile. Finally he came into view, he looked good, no he looked great! He told me later he didn't push himself, so he wouldn't look like he was dying, just for me. He also told me that he had gotten off to a bad start due to PPP, porta potty problems. Since most of you reading this are runners, I'll leave the definition of PPP to your imagination. Near the finish line he not only acknowledged my yells, but he pointed his finger at me and shouted "NOT THE MAMA'S." Whoops, I had on his brand new jacket we had bought at the mall the day before. After the runners retrieved their dry clothes, we were off in the van and on the way back to the hotel. I have never been surrounded by a more appreciable bunch in my life. They kept thanking me, saying a nice warm 20 minute van ride was a heck of a lot better than a cold, hour long bumpy train ride while sitting amongst sweaty bodies. It was my pleasure.

Comments that I heard from the runners were that the race was very well organized, the course was good,

the weather was perfect for a long run, and the after race packets were exceptionally good, especially the Jelly-Bellys. (Thank you to those who shared.) If this group (or maybe even a bigger group) run the race next year, I will be happy to be your bystander and conveyor again. However, we're coming earlier, so I can spend more time at the mall!!!
