ON DAN'S RUN FRIENDSHIP FESTIVAL 5K

The Bourbonnais Friendship Festival 5K & 1.5 Mile Fun Run was Saturday, June 29, part of the 49th Annual Bourbonnais Friendship Festival, a ma-

jor community event including a carnival complete with Ferris wheel, beer tent, fish fry, parades

and fireworks over four days.

The Friendship Festival race began in 1981, a 10K staged from the

Alan Shepard School with five year age divisions 19-24 and 25-29, then ten year from 30-39 and 40-49, then 50 and up. The registration fee was \$6.00 pre-registered and \$7.00 on race day. It became a 5K at some point, most frequently staged from the Bourbonnais Municipal Center. The course has changed a couple times and I believe there were one or more years that the race was not run. It has been both a Saturday and a

Sunday race. This year it was on

Saturday morning began with a mixture of clouds and sunshine, a Florida-like 77 degrees, dew

point of 75, and 86% humidity, the smothering conditions that make a runner's lungs ache. Ugh! We had a week of 90 degree plus days earlier in June, but with dew points only in the 60s.



The race is staged on Latham Drive next to the Briarcliff Professional Center, a 3-4 minute drive from our home. I arrived a little before 7:00, found a short line at the registration tent, and got my bib and shirt, a pretty blue one this year. I retreated to the van, got my bib on, and grabbed the camera.

I found Paul and Marianne Suprenant talking with Pat Koerner. Rod Kahl was nearby and I asked him to

join the group for a photo. OOPS! My camera didn't like the dew point and the lens was fogged. I walked back to the van and hoped it would adjust by the time the race was over.



We assembled at the starting line just before 7:30. There would be 88 runners and 15 walkers, an increase from last year's 91 participants, but still not back to a pre-COVID 2019 total of 140.

Paul Suprenant would be my "target" as he

had been at the Klipp 5K a month earlier where he got me at the finish line by just over a second. There was no glory for either of us there with a 70 plus age group, but FF added a 75 plus age group. Paul, about 3 years my junior, and I

> would be the only ones in that age group. The race started right on time and I decided to run Paul's pace instead of trying to catch him late in the race.

The second mile began and the asphalt trail curved downward to our left for a couple tenths before curving back up. Volunteer Phil Newberry kept us from taking the fork in the trail down to the river. I asked him how retirement from USPS was going and he responded "Great!"



Paul and I crested the hill at about 1.5 miles and my legs said "Walk!" Paul kept picking them up and putting them down. I didn't measure the time or distance of my walk which would be the first of half a dozen in the last half of the race.

While I struggled, Cody McCullough was doing what he does in these races, winning! The Florida-like weather seemingly had no

effect as he cruised to a 16:18 finish. Pat Koerner earned a first in 60-64 with a 22:07 and Rod Kahl was second in 55-59 with a 23:54.

The 2-mile mark came shortly before we exited the Perry Farm, a 12:29. Back on the streets, I walked and ran, walked and ran what seemed like a never-ending 5K. During one walking segment, I was passed by a tall, older runner, also walking, who I would later learn was John Schimmel. I ran a bit and passed him. I walked and he ran by me. The third mile came with a 13:22. Was he an age group competitor? Maybe. I no longer have a finish line sprint on a good day, but I gave it all I had



as the finish line loomed and got him by one second. It didn't matter. He was in 70-74.

Watching the awards' presentation

Paul bested me by a minute with a 37:24 for first in 75+ and his wife, Marianne, beat both of us with a 36:44 for first in 65-69. My 38:27 earned me second in 75+. Paul and I were the only ones in the age

group.



The camera was ready for post-race photos so I socialized and took the memory book photos. I chatted with Gregg Duckworth who I remembered from races 40 years ago. Made small talk with race director Maureen Montgomery, who I hadn't seen in years, and husband Mike. Although we have a new generation or two of runners, I was pleasantly surprised at how many I knew. Some, like Leon Malone, 94, and Ken Klipp, 75, have retired the racing shoes, but are still part of the fun.
